

Teachers Leading the Way

Sauk Centre School District is in the process of implementing QComp. Part of the QComp plan is assigning PLC (Professional Learning Community) leaders for each PLC group. Last week our PLC leaders had an opportunity to participate in a data retreat. Together we made observations, analyzed, and dissected MCA (Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment) data from the previous year. This is a CRITICAL step in determining our student achievement strengths as well as areas for improvement. In addition, this infor-



mation will be used as a tool to help guide instruction inside the classroom. I am excited to continue to work with these teacher leaders as we plan and implement ways to improve Sauk Centre School District. Working side-by-side teachers is one of my favorite elements of being a principal and growing and/or learning as a team is essential in school improvement.

Relentless Forward Progress

As I reflect upon the first quarter of the 2016-17 school year, I keep finding examples of how we are moving forward as a school and district. It has been exhilarating to both observe the growth and to be part of it! New initiatives such as QComp, the integration of technology, and an exciting new class are keeping us focused on enhancing student learning experiences and fostering 21st century skills so they are competitive in our global economy.

As I mentioned in the previous newsletter, we are in our first year of implementing QComp. This state funded program provides our teachers with peer support and coaching. Five secondary teachers (nine total teachers throughout the district) have taken on leadership roles that include facilitating monthly professional learning communities and daily peer coaching in addition to their teaching duties. These nine teachers have had a lot of training this fall, and I am so proud of their leadership and commitment to improving teaching and learning.

Thanks to the generous support of our community in last fall's technology levy, Chromebooks have been distributed to our tenth grade students. These students have these devices with them as a learning tool for every class. Teachers and students continue to discover new ways to use this tool to enhance learning. The addition of our Technology Integrationist, Gordy Hagert, provides necessary support for teachers and

students as they learn how to best integrate this device into classrooms.

Finally, we are so excited about our new course, Careers in the Com-

munity, which partners with Felling Trailers. Students are given an amazing opportunity to learn on-site each day at Felling under the shared

leadership of our Industrial Technology teacher, Jake Fischer, and Felling Trailers employee, Ben Myhre. Mr. Fischer worked with Felling Trailers to design a curriculum that provides real-world work experiences and general 21st century career skills. Students are learning how to weld



on state of the art equipment and are exposed to many other facets of the company.

Overall, we are thrilled with the

progress we are already making and eager to continue on the path of moving forward. In

this world of constant technological advancements, our students need to be prepared for careers that haven't even been invented yet. It is our mission to prepare our students for their futures and we believe all of these efforts are providing them with the necessary 21st century skills of collaboration, problem-solving, creativity, and communication.

Alan Page Addresses 7 -12 Students:






